### **About the Month of Shevat**

During Shevat, the days begin to grow longer, and the sun shines a bit brighter. In Israel, spring begins in Shevat. Deep underground, the roots of trees slowly wind their way towards water. High above our heads, branches stretch toward the brightening sun.

In Israel almond trees begin to blossom in Shevat. Because they are the first to bloom each Shevat and the nut resembles an eye, an almond tree is called shaked (watcher). Almond trees are said to "keep watch" for spring.



### From the Rabbi

Signs of Renewal: Four Days in the Life of Congregation Sons of Zion

Saturday, January 18 – Services this Shabbat incorporated many aspects of the Jewish Renewal movement. Accompanied by Yitzchak Carlton's guitar, he and Rivka Mazel-Carlton led beautiful singing, including new melodies that really touched the soul. Rivka explained the

themes of the Torah reading in a way that invited us to make a personal connection to the text, as evidenced by the large number of people who came up to the Torah for each of the group aliyot. Fran Welson's introduction to the silent Amidah helped us connect with this part of the service with greater insight and intensity, and her initiating a Rekindle Shabbat grant from the Harold Grinspoon Foundation made possible an extra special lunch following the service.

For many who attended, this was their first time at Sons of Zion. Judging by the warm welcome they received and by their participation during and after the service, this hopefully won't be their last visit to SOZ. In fact at least one of them showed up bright and early at services the following Shabbat.

Wednesday, January 22 – Last month I wrote about our experiment with moving the Thursday morning service to Wednesday afternoon at 5:15, following a light snack at 5:00 pm. This was our first attempt, and I am pleased to report that it was a resounding success! We had more than enough participants to make a minyan of 10.

To my great dismay, however, I was not among them. Just my luck, I was stuck on Route 91 for nearly 4 hours because a truck carrying lumber dropped its load and tied up traffic. Fortunately congregants stepped up to lead the service and saved the day. I am really sorry that I missed this historic occasion, but I am so grateful for the many people who showed up and for those who spontaneously stepped up to lead the service.

Saturday, January 25 – We regularly have a strong minyan on Shabbat mornings, but this week we attained the quorum of 10 especially early in the service. Several new participants helped make the singing even more uplifting than usual. We had to bring additional chairs to the tables to accommodate the large crowd for lunch, and at least part of the lively conversation over lunch included a spontaneous discussion of the Torah portion.

We then gathered for a scheduled session after lunch to do songs about trees, nature, and the environment in preparation for Tu B'Shvat, the holiday known as the New Year of the Trees. I thought I had made more than enough copies of the songs for everyone, but so many people

stayed that we had to double up. Also about five people who could not attend services that morning at SOZ because of other obligations, joined us just for the song session. It went so well that several people wanted to keep singing even after we had completed all the planned songs. So sing some more we did!

Wednesday, January 29 – How would we do on our second Wednesday afternoon service? We had a full minyan again, so we're off to an even better start! And this time I was able to make it and enjoy it.

At a time when other congregations much larger than ours no longer have weekday minyanim, we are rallying to preserve ours so that folks can say kaddish if they need to and so that folks can enjoy a brief service and time together if they don't. We are here for each other.

We step up to lead services as well -- be they Renewal services that offer a new approach to one another or a minyan when the need arises.

New folks continue to find their way to SOZ. Here they find that our smaller congregation offers a warm personal welcome and a sense of belonging that cannot always be found elsewhere.

We are here because we are looking for more, not less. We want to sing more, not less. We may be small in number, but strong in spirit and connection.

The four days described above demonstrate the growth and vitality of SOZ. If you have been here during this time, you know what I mean. If you have not been here in a while, check it out.

Tu B'Shvat, the holiday that we celebrate on Sunday night, February 9, marks the renewal of nature and the beginning of the new growth of spring. I believe that Tu B'Shvat also serves as a metaphor for the renewal of energy and commitment that we are experiencing at SOZ. It's happening here and now: come and enjoy and be renewed!

# Sons of Zion Adult Education Lecture Series III: WHAT WAS THE DREYFUS AFFAIR?

Presented by Author and Scholar, Dr. Simon Sibelman



When Alfred Dreyfus was arrested for espionage in 1894, few in France or around the world could have imagined the case would malinger for a bitter 12 years. It would also set the stage for many events that would engulf the world – Jewish and non-Jewish – over the course of the 20<sup>th</sup> century as the *Affaire Dreyfus* unleashed a tidal wave of anti-Semitic rhetoric and visual imagery the intensity of which had previously been unknown. Many individuals would sense the need to become philosemitic, to stand with Dreyfus and the Jews, and for Viennese journalist

Theodore Herzel to recognize the necessity to establish a Jewish State. This illustrated lecture will explore these and other pressing issues born of the Affair.



#### Reflections on the Renewal Service by Katalina Van Santos

"I haven't been to Saturday morning services in over a decade and generally have no idea of the structure of Jewish services at all. Today, I went 5 minutes away from my apartment to Holyoke for a Renewal Service and was greeted by fellow service-goers in such a warm fashion for a stranger that it really caught me off guard. Tell a stranger the door was open? Help me hang my coat? In an age of heightened security, this congregation used trust to guide me into their shul.

The renewal service led by Caroline Rivkah Mazel-Carlton was nothing short of amazing. We sat in a circle of folding chairs, chanting people, a humble but extraordinarily proud congregation had been in Holyoke this whole time and I hadn't known it.

I wanted to cry about 10 minutes after I walked in the door. Crying is how I marked my need to convert. Crying is not something my body does easily. Crying is primal and vulnerable and I felt wholeness being this fractured broken prayer-goer helping to hold together our cries to the Divine with our gaping flaws. My mouth kept pushing out prayers I hadn't heard before-thats always been the case with me and Judaism but I've never told a rabbi for fear of being called "crazy."

I realized it was fine to hear voices. This is something I'd accepted on a very base scientific level, but I felt it root within me this time. I realized it was fine to see things. Hallucinations are visions and whispers of a brain trying to meld the multiple worlds we and our souls navigate.

This morning was so, so blessed and I'm so thankful that I got to experience it."
