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### About the Month of Sivan

In the month of Sivan, we celebrate the holiday of Shavuot, when the Torah was given by G–d to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai more than 3,300 years ago. Every year on the holiday of Shavuot, we renew our acceptance of G–d's gift, and G–d "re-gives" the Torah.

The holiday of Shavuot is a two-day holiday, beginning at sundown of the fifth of Sivan and lasting until nightfall of the seventh of Sivan. (In Israel it is a one-day holiday, ending at nightfall of the sixth of Sivan.)

The Newest Jewish Holiday

As we were about to begin singing after lunch last Shabbat, May 25, I asked people to name the next Jewish holiday. Some said Lag B'Omer, which had just passed. Some said Shavuot, which was about two weeks ahead. But no one said Yom Yerushalayim – Jerusalem Day, which this year falls on June 2.

So I'd like to focus this article on the subject of this newest of Jewish holidays celebrating one of the oldest cities in the world.

First a little background...

In 1947 the United Nations passed the Partition Plan that divided most of the territory of Palestine into two states: one Jewish and one Arab. But Jerusalem was to become an international city under UN jurisdiction. In theory this would guarantee free access to the Jerusalem holy sites of the three monotheistic religions.

Israel accepted the Partition Plan and declared independence in 1948 on the area allotted to it. The neighboring Arab states rejected the Partition Plan even though it called for a Palestinian Arab state alongside Israel. Instead they attacked the nascent state of Israel.

When the fighting ended, much of the new city of Jerusalem was captured by Israel.

All of the Old City of Jerusalem was captured by Jordan. The Old City included the site of the two ancient Temples, the Western Wall of the Temple Mount, and many synagogues. Just outside the Old City walls was the ancient Jewish cemetery on Har Hazeitim, the Mount of Olives. All of that fell into Jordanian hands.

Despite the UN Partition Plan's intention to guarantee free access to Jewish, Muslim, and Christian holy sites, Jews were not allowed access to the Old City, including what had been known as the Jewish Quarter, as well as the Western Wall. Instead synagogues in the Jewish Quarter were destroyed or desecrated, a road was built over graves in the middle of the Mount of Olives cemetery, and some gravestones were even used for latrines.

When the 1967 Six Day War broke out, Israel urged Jordan not to join the war along with its Egyptian and Syrian allies, but Jordan opened up a third front against Israel by shelling Israeli-held sections of Jerusalem. Israel responded, and captured all of the Jewish holy sites in Jerusalem and more. For the first time in 19 years, Jews were again able to pray at the

Western Wall, visit the 3,000 year old Jewish cemetery on the Mount of Olives, and return to the Jewish Quarter in the Old City of Jerusalem.

Yom Yerushalayim, Jerusalem Day, was established as a holiday by Israel to mark the renewal of Jewish control over Jerusalem and Jewish access to our holy sites and to where King David established Jerusalem as the capital of the first Jewish commonwealth some 3,000 years ago.

For many of us who are old enough to remember the anxiety-filled days leading up to the 1967 Six Day War, and the huge relief that ensued when Israel emerged victorious, this was not history learned from books but intensively experienced in our lives.

I remember it vividly. Less than two months after the Six Day War, I arrived in Israel to spend my junior year of college at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. I saw how the Mount of Olives cemetery had been desecrated. As I have written in an earlier newsletter, I was at the Western Wall on Simchat Torah dancing in celebration with tens of thousands of Jews who were able to do so for the first time in 19 years. I loved walking through every nook and cranny of Jerusalem. I remember experiencing how shops closed early on Friday afternoons and busses stopped running as the whole atmosphere of Jewish neighborhoods in Jerusalem became infused with the spirit of Shabbat. I encountered Jews from all over the world brought together by the magic of Jerusalem. And I felt the full awesomeness of Yom Kippur in Jerusalem, not only in synagogues, but also in the quiet streets where both religious and secular Jews respected the sanctity of the day by not driving.

Twenty years later I returned to spend another year in Jerusalem, this time with my wife Shoshana and our two kids. It is hard to explain, but life seemed more intense in Jerusalem. Whether it was getting tear gassed for the first and only time in my life (that's a longer story...) or collecting palm fronds that were distributed around the city to provide schach to cover the tops of succot, like the makeshift succah we built in our shared courtyard with the help of our neighbors, or the kindly, elderly Holocaust-survivor couple, Yoel and Yoela, who gave our kids sweets when we stopped in their tiny market near our apartment – so much in Jerusalem took on a larger than life significance. Although it did not work out, Jerusalem became such a part of us that Shoshana and I seriously explored job possibilities there before we left to return to the States.

There is something in Jerusalem that touches the Jewish soul. We pray for the rebuilding of Jerusalem in the daily Amidah prayers. We pray facing Jerusalem. It would not surprise me if Jerusalem has more songs and poems written to and about it than any other city in the world.

And we end two of the most observed Jewish holy days – Yom Kippur and Passover – with reciting L'Shana Haba'ah B'Yirushalayim: Next Year in Jerusalem.

If this article reaches you in time for Yom Yerushalayim – which falls on Sunday, June 2 this year – I invite you to take a moment on that day to think about the significance of Jerusalem in your life and in the life of our people.

And if you have never been to Jerusalem or if you would like to renew your connection with this city that touches the human soul -- being holy not only to Jews but to Christians and Muslims as well – then you might consider going to Jerusalem and Israel with Sons of Zion. In response to members' requests, we are seriously exploring the possibility of a congregational trip to Israel next spring. A portion of the annual meeting on Thursday, June 27<sup>th</sup>, will be devoted to discussing what kind of trip we might offer. Please bring your ideas and input. Together we just might be able to make Next Year in Jerusalem a reality for Sons of Zion!

We are here to celebrate Rhoda and Jerry And remember the good times, Of which there are many.


Their life's Theme is Love and Caring, Full of Kindness and lots of Sharing.

## **SOZ Cemetery Rules**

#### **Cemetery Guidelines**

- 1. Synagogue member in good standing for at least 5 years prior to death are entitled to a free plot
- 2. Plot fee for non-members is \$4,500. Plot for a spouse on a double lot is \$2,250.
- 3. Opening and closing of grave is \$800
- 4. Perpetual care is \$1,500.
- 5. Cremated remains are permitted. Digging of hole for urn or ashes is \$100 in addition to the plot fee (instead of a grave fee).

Non-Jewish spouses or family members will be buried in a separate plot (no non-Jewish religious symbols are allowed).

No concrete vaults are allowed. Simple unfinished wood caskets only.

Taharah-ritual Jewish washing and shroud are required, but a shower or watch person is optional.

A particular plot may be reserved for \$100. There are several plots in the new section that were previously reserved and are now unused. Please call for more details.

## **Safety and Security Grants**

Safety and Security Grants

After a number of years of dedication to working on security issues, Congregation Sons of Zion's is pleased to announce we are the recipients of a \$3,700 security grant from the Jewish Federation of Western Mass, an additional smaller grant to provide dinner at trainings in June, <u>and</u> a \$50,000 Homeland Security Grant to be used to enhance safety to our building and our members and visitors. The larger grant has five components that were identified in the report provided to us by James McGinnis, Safety and Threat consultant, originally hired by the Jewish Federation of Western Mass. The five components that were funded are:

- 1. Training by a safety and threat expert designed specifically for us based on the layout of our building and the demographic of our membership on safety awareness and how to respond to an Active Shooter incident.
- 2. Improvements and additions to our existing security alarm and camera system.
- 3. Reinforcement of our exterior doors and replacement of the Cabot Street door. Installation of new solid core doors between the funeral vestibule and the main hallways leading to the sanctuaries.
- 4. Reinforcement and adding a protection the stained glass windows.
- 5. Addition of custom metal grating on the ground level windows that can be opened from the inside in case of emergency.

The deadline for both grants work to be completed is June 30, 2019.

We would like to thank the steadfast work of Andrea Fox, Joan Rosner, and James McGinnis, the consultant who has generously remained working with us to guide and advise through the grant installation and implementation process.
