About the Month of Adar

Known as a month of celebration and happiness, the late-winter month of Adar contains the joyous holiday of Purim that takes place mid-month. Purim, however, isn't the only thing that makes Adar special. The Hebrew name "Adar" is related to the word "adir," which denotes strength and power.

Adar is the only month in the Jewish calendar that comes back for seconds. The Jewish leap year, or shanah me'uberet (literally "pregnant year" in Hebrew), occurs approximately once every three years. In order to assure that the lunar months of the Jewish year stay in sync with the solar calendar, an additional month of Adar is added.

This year we enjoy a single Adar.



A Message from the Rabbi

Angry...frightened...heartsick...terrified...unsafe... numb...amazed...grateful...not surprised...l want to scream...holding on to hope...upset...sad.

These are the words participants in our SOZ prayer study group used to describe how they were feeling when we met six days after the storming of the Capitol building in Washington, DC. (I'll come back in a

moment to the connection between these feeling and the subject of the prayer study session.)

After sharing these feelings, we talked about how, way back in the day before printing, prayers were not all written out in siddurim (prayer books). People had pretty good memories back then and all they needed to remember was the fixed 5-8 word closing blessing for each of the eighteen blessings (later nineteen) of the Amidah. The first three words of each closing blessing were always the same: Baruch Ata Adonai (Praised are You Adonai). The next 2-5 words summarized the unique theme of each blessing – such as "Healer of the sick of Your people," or "who graciously grants us intelligence," or "Sovereign who loves justice and compassion." The summarizing formula for each blessing was known as the chatima – which means "signature" – of the blessing.

The Amidah was recited standing (hence the word Amidah, which means standing) quietly, individually by each person at their own pace. Then the Amidah was repeated out loud for everyone (with certain additions) by the designated prayer leader for that day's service.

Both the individual prayer participants and the prayer leader would improvise on the theme of each blessing. They would use their own words to express and connect their feelings with the theme of each blessing, and they would conclude the blessing with the chatimah - the fixed closing signature words - that summarized the theme of the blessing.

With this background, we invited each participant to think about the heartfelt feelings they had expressed at the beginning of the session, and then select a closing blessing (chatimah) from one of the 18 (19) Amidah blessings that reflected those feelings. Each participant was then invited to write their own thoughts and feelings that would conclude with the traditional closing formula (chatimah) that linked to them.

We then invited people to share what they wrote with one another. It was very powerful to witness how each participant connected their heartfelt feelings about their current experience with the centuries old closing words of the blessing they had chosen. The traditional closing words of the prayers came alive for us, maybe for the first time for some. We could all experience a deep and meaningful personal connection with the prayers -- how these traditional words can help us make a link with and express our innermost challenges, hopes, and yearnings.

As we discussed the prayers that we had just written, someone asked for a copy of one of the prayers. That quickly led to a suggestion to share our prayers with one another - which quickly led to the suggestion that we share these "home-made" prayers with the whole congregation. People sent in their prayers anonymously and I am happy to share them with you at the end of this article along with one take-away from the study group that I hope may be helpful to you in your own spiritual life.

Here's the take-away: Don't start your prayers with the words of the prayer book. Start with the

yearnings of your heart. Start with the cry in your soul. Start by taking time to get in touch with whatever pain or joy or hope that you are feeling. Then turn to the words of the prayer book to make a connection between your feelings of the moment and the traditional well-springs of support that our people have turned to over the centuries. Or simply let the melodies of the prayers lift you and carry you to where you need to go.

Here are the prayers that the study group sent to share with you:

- Heal us, Adonai; heal us from a pandemic we thought we would never see in our lifetime. Arrogant beings that we are, we read of rats spreading pestilence in Medieval Europe and smugly felt safe in our world of illusions. We are humbled by Covid sneaking in and snatching precious lives away. And we are thankful for your angels the research scientists, doctors, nurses and others the heroes of our time. Praised are You, Lord, Healer of the people Israel.
- •God, please help me to fully open my heart, to fully feel your presence, and to make a positive difference in the lives of people I interact with today. Help me to know and act from and speak from a place of wisdom, respect, integrity, kindness, compassion, clarity and truth. Help me to bring my best self forward.
- •We all have faults, Dear Lord some great, some small. We have sins known and unknown, said and unsaid. Things done and left undone. In this time of such horrible anger, human cruelty and hate, may our eyes and hearts become open to the simple lovingkindness that is your first and primary gift. Bring us back to that truth, with open eyes, to begin again. I ask this with a small hope for the world that my beloved sons will inherit. Please pardon us, for we have transgressed; for You forgive and pardon. Praised are you Adonai, gracious and forgiving.
- •Uproot and crush the arrogant and hypocrite. Subdue and humble them. Blessed are you Adonai who humbles them. (This was written after watching the news)
- •As far as each of us stands from one another. Fists clenched and hearts closed. Praised be those who can calmly gather with peace and respect for others. Sound the great shofar to herald our freedoms, gather our exiles, those in the center, those on the outskirts, those who are hidden or invisible, those with privileged voices. Gather our dispersed from the ends of the earth. Praised are you Adonai, who gathers the dispersed of the people Israel.
- •Bless us at all times with your gift of peace. Help me ignore those who would slander. Frustrate the designs of those who plot evil. Make nothing of their schemes. Bless us with peace.
- •We have an ideal of what a society should be. We call it Zion a just society, governed by laws of fairness and justice. We are hurting now we have strayed from the path. Instead of lovingkindness, there is anger; instead of caring, there is division; instead of joy, there is fear. Help us renew our vision, help us heal our pain, help us learn to respect difference so that we may again say: Praised are You who restores the divine presence to Zion.

May the words of our mouths and the meditations of our hearts link us to our higher selves, to one another and to the Source of our being. (From Psalm 19 - adapted).



SOZ's Hamantaschen

- 3 sticks butter or margarine softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 6 tbsp orange juice
- 1 tbsp vanilla extract
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 4-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- Filling(s) of your choice

Parchment paper

- 1. In a large bowl, cream together butter and sugar until smooth.
- 2. Beat in the eggs one at a time.
- 3. Stir in the orange juice and vanilla.
- 4. Mix in baking powder, gradually stir in flour until dough forms a ball.
- 5. Cover and refrigerate at least 2 hours overnight works well.
- 6. Preheat oven to 375°F. Place parchment paper on cookie sheets (or grease cookie sheets).
- 7. On a lightly floured surface, roll the dough out to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut into 3 inch circles with cookie cutter, glass or cup. Spoon 1 tsp of filling into the center of each circle (anymore and it will ooze out). Pinch the sides of each circle to form a triangle, covering as much of the top as possible. Transfer to cookie sheets and place in the freezer for about 5 minutes.
- 8. Bake 8 to 10 minutes in the preheated oven until light golden brown. These are best under-cooked slightly. Cool on baking sheet for a few minutes and move to wire racks to cool completely.
