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## About the Month of Iyar

Although Iyar does not contain many "special days," every single day of the month is included in the Sefirat HaOmer, the mitzvah of counting each of the 49 days between Passover and Shavuot. Sefirat HaOmer is a period of introspection and self-refinement, as we prepare ourselves to receive the Torah anew on Shavuot. Each day of Iyar represents another step in this spiritual journey toward Sinai.



### From the Rabbi

I am sending my monthly newsletter article to you in advance of the newsletter itself because I want to let you know in time about an upcoming, important and unique Jewish event that is happening very soon.

What event?, you ask.

Here are a few clues:

The event involves a Jewish holiday that is not mentioned in the Torah, but has roots that go back 3,000 years.

Even with such ancient roots, the holiday is actually very new in terms of the long sweep of Jewish history.

This Jewish holiday, when it was enacted, actually went against long-standing Jewish traditional practice, yet it is widely celebrated both by secular and most branches of religious Jews today. Those ultra-orthodox Jews who oppose this holiday generally do so more out of historical concerns than Jewish legal considerations (halacha).

This year, the holiday can be celebrated together simultaneously online all around the world, even by Jews who refrain from using electricity on other Jewish holidays.

And - last clue - in addition to the international celebration, we at SOZ will be having our own special Zoom get-together, and it will all be happening this Wednesday, April 29.

As you may already have determined, the holiday is...Yom Ha'atzma'ut, Israel Independence Day.

What follows is some historical background -- or just skip to the end of this article to find out how you can mark the day with Jews all over the world and with our SOZ community.

Although the first modern Yom Ha'atzma'ut fell on May 15, 1948 (corresponding to the Jewish calendar date of the 5<sup>th</sup> of Iyar, 5708) when David Ben Gurion declared Israel's independence, the precedent for a self-governing Jewish "state" in that part of the world was set when King David established the First Jewish Commonwealth with Jerusalem as its capitol some 3,000 years earlier. His son, King Solomon, built the Temple in Jerusalem, which symbolized Jewish religious and national independence.

That first Temple was destroyed by the Babylonians in 586 BCE and Jews were exiled from their land. Eventually Jews were allowed to return, a second Temple was built on the site of the first Temple, and Jewish independence was re-established with Jerusalem again as its capitol. That Second Jewish Commonwealth lasted until 70 CE, when the second Temple was destroyed by the Romans on Tisha B'Av, the 9th day of the month of Av, a Jewish day of fasting and mourning. That date marked the end of Jewish self-rule, and it could well have marked the end of Jewish aspirations to live as a free and independent people in our own land.

Over the centuries that followed, Jews became an international people, dispersed all over the world. There was no central governing body to unite them. We probably would have eventually disappeared as a people from the face of the earth were it not for an enduring memory of and yearning for Jerusalem. In our daily prayers we faced Jerusalem. Passover, we declared L'Shana Haba'ah B'Yerushalayim, Next Year in Jerusalem.

The re-establishment of Jewish independence in the land of Israel after nearly 1900 years of statelessness and dispersion has to be one of the most amazing stories in the annals of human history. That is why Yom Ha'atzma'ut marks not only an event that happened 72 years ago. It is also a culmination of centuries of Jewish history and yearning.

The day the modern state of Israel declared its independence falls in the 49 day period known as the time of the counting of the omer. This is a period of semi-mourning that lasts from the second night of Passover until Shavuot. Because a plague during this time devastated the students of Rabbi Akiva who were part of the unsuccessful Bar Kochba revolt against the Romans, celebrations like weddings, parties, and dancing traditionally do not take place during this time. (Exceptions are the 33<sup>rd</sup> day of the omer -- Lag B'Omer -- and the festive new moons - Rosh Hodesh -- of Iyar and Sivan that fall during the omer period.)

Even though Yom Ha'atzma'ut falls during the omer period of semi-mourning, most Jews, including many traditionally orthodox rabbinical authorities, allow and encourage this modern holiday of celebration to override the traditional restrictions of the omer period. In Israel and elsewhere, for example, Jewish weddings now take place on Yom Ha'atzma'ut as well as on Lag B'Omer and Rosh Hodesh during the omer period. Yom Ha'atzma'ut is thus seen as so significant as a religious as well as secular holiday that it overrides a centuries-old tradition of semi-mourning during omer.

So how can we celebrate Yom Ha'atzma'ut today? The plague of covid-19 is not going to stop us now any more than the plague in the days of Bar Kochba stopped the yearning for Jewish independence among the students of Bar Kochba.

Jews not only in Israel but around the world will be coming together to celebrate online. On Yom Ha'atzma'ut, which falls on Wednesday, April 29, there will be a Worldwide Celebration of Yom Ha'atzma'ut from 2:00 - 3:00 pm, our time. It should be quite extraordinary! Invitations and links were sent yesterday, and they will be sent out today and tomorrow as well.

Our own special SOZ program for Yom Ha'atzma'ut will be on Wednesday, April 29. It follows the weekly pre-mincha minyan schmooze at 5:00 pm and the minyan itself at 5:15 pm. At about 5:30 pm, we will have a Zoom get-together to share our own experiences, memories, and stories about Israel. Whether or not we have actually been there, we will explore how Israel affects our identity as Jews today and how our relationship with Israel may have developed and changed over time. Access the program by Zoom or by phone if you don't have Zoom. The synagogue will be emailing links to Zoom and the phone conference connection in time for Wednesday's minyan. Please join us, and be prepared to hear -- and share your own - great Israel stories and thoughts about what Israel means to us today!
