The month of Tammuz begins the "season" of the summer. The three months of this season are Tammuz, Av and Flul.





Rabbi's Message

I was asked to give a short report of my activities for the past year. So much has happened that I'd like to focus specifically on new things that we did this year to make religious life at SOZ meaningful and engaging.

Leading up to High Holidays for the first time, we offered daily shofar blowing each morning (except Shabbat) over

Zoom during the last half of the month of Elul as a way to begin to prepare ourselves spiritually for Rosh Hashana. Five people volunteered to lead the shofar blowing.

For the Torah reading on the first day of Rosh Hashana, as usual people were called up to the bimah for an aliyah to do the Torah blessings, one person for each of five aliyot. The new wrinkle was that each of them gave a short talk -- one paragraph or so that they had prepared in advance -- about the Torah portion that was about to be read. They spoke about what was personally meaningful or noteworthy for them in that Torah portion. This helped make the Torah reading more accessible for everyone.

For the past several years, the service on the second morning of Rosh Hashana has involved some kind of study and discussion on a theme relevant to the High Holidays. This year, seven people gave thoughtful and moving talks in the form of a letter to someone: three asking for forgiveness for something they regretted; three expressing appreciation to someone for some act of kindness; and one imagining a hoped-for reconciliation. These talks modeled beautifully and powerfully how the High Holidays might inspire us to seek forgiveness for our negative actions and to express appreciation for the positive deeds of others.

We continued this dual theme at Tashlich on the second day of Rosh Hashana. In addition to our usual practice of symbolically casting away our negative behaviors by throwing challah into the waters of the canal, we also talked about positive deeds/mitzvot we have done or wish to do. After someone shared a new/positive behavior that they felt good about doing, they were rewarded with an M & M candy -- that we dubbed a Mitzvah Morsel. Tashlich thus became an opportunity to affirm our positive behaviors as well as consider the negatives.

About 25 people took part in leading some aspect of High Holiday services, giving a

talk, leading part of the service and so on. I am pleased that SOZ services are not a spectator sport, but rather an opportunity for active participation and sharing. A noted Jewish educator, Joel Grishaver, said: what we remember, what we take away most from a service or discussion or program is what we said or did.

Both Simchat Torah and Purim were celebrated for the first time at someone's home: the Freyman's. Both were very participatory as we danced around with the Torah outside on their patio, and people gave some very creative and even multi-media renderings of the chapters of the Megillah

For Hanukkah, menorah lighting at City Hall on the first night and at the Rosner's on the last night, were lovely but not new. What was renewed was our chorus rehearsing and then leading spirited singing. Several new members of the synagogue joined the chorus.

Shavuot. Other than the Torah portion being the 10 Commandments, this year's Shavuot service had many elements that we introduced that were unlike any previous Shavuot service I can remember at SOZ. We welcomed a new convert to the community who spoke beautifully about her process of conversion; we had two of our younger members come up for an aliyah for the first time to mark their becoming a bar and bat mitzvah; and we welcomed new members who had joined the synagogue in the last year -- three couples and five singles for a total of 11 people in all. As a way of introducing themselves to the community on this holiday that marks the giving of the 10 Commandments, several new members chose to talk about a commandment that was especially meaningful to them.

One other new and poignant element in this service was that Yizkor not only included remembering deceased biological family members, but also included deceased members of our SOZ extended family. Many congregants sent written remembrances and even photos in advance that were displayed in the hallway, to honor and recall with affection people who made the synagogue a warm and caring community. During Yizkor we took time to walk through the hallway and read those remembrances.

This may have been the last service - and almost certainly the last Shavuot service - that we hold in the main sanctuary, a space that holds special memories and meaning for

many of us. As our building is about to be sold, this Shavuot service was a mixture of nostalgia and loss as expressed in Yizkor and also of renewal and celebration by welcoming a new person into the Jewish people, two b'nei mitzvah, and the new members, about half of them in their 20's and 30's, who have joined us and are already actively participating in SOZ.

I was asked to give a report about my activities for the past year. You might well be wondering why I have been describing new -- and I hope creative and meaningful -- ways that involve others. My goal as your rabbi is to help all of us feel part of a vibrant, caring, warm, participatory, spiritual community. To help us feel connected to each other, to our tradition, and to the Source of our being. And the best way I know how to do that is to have all of us share our stories, our joys and sorrows, to share ourselves with one another.

I want to end by thanking Joan and Rich, the Religious Committee Co-Chairs, for everything they do, and especially for giving me the support and encouragement to try new ways to make our services and holidays meaningful and uplifting. I want to thank Bonnie and Shoshana who have joined me almost every Shabbat at my home on Zoom, along with Isy a young woman with a sweet voice who sings with us when she can, to help you hear several pleasant voices singing together even when we cannot all sing together out loud on Zoom.

This third year of almost all our services on Zoom could have been a disaster as we prepare to leave our familiar space for a place as yet unknown. Instead, quite the opposite as happened: we have become closer as a community, we are welcoming new members of all ages, and our participation has grown in numbers and in depth. I deeply appreciate everyone for your openness to trying new things, your resilience, and your active participation that strengthens us all. Thank you so much!

President's Message

It has been an eventful time for my first year as your President. I came in during the Covid virus crisis. We were not meeting in person but tried hard to stay in touch with Zoom. Our Zoom Shabbat and minyan services were fortunately well attended. In fact, our congregation has grown this year with many new members. My husband Bill

and I hosted the Annual Picnic at our home in Belchertown which was a really fun event. The difficult decision to sell our 19,000 square foot building which has good bones but needs a lot of updating, was made. We did manage to have a wonderful time at the Holyoke Jewish Homecoming with a large crowd wanting to visit the building where so many had grown up and attended Hebrew School. The High Holidays drew good numbers of members who had missed attending services in person. A water leak occurred which meant replacing some piping and a gas leak which required new piping also. The city shut the gas to the building off until the leak could be repaired. Since the building had been listed for sale, we made the decision not to do the repairs and close the building for the winter. The Rosners hosted our annual Hanukkah party at their home which was a warm and wonderful time as always. In the meantime, we were fortunate that the Massachusetts Economic Development council, of which we are members was working to help the city restore the High Street corridor.

They connected us with The Lighthouse School, a local private school with some state funding, who fell in love with our old building, and we negotiated a reasonable price to sell it to them. Since they are partially state funded the closing will not take place for several months. Fortunately, the state agreed to help pay the costs of fixing the gas piping and turning the water and heat back on.

We are able to meet in the building at least temporarily until we find a new home for

our congregation. Having looked at dozens of possibilities, we needed to find a building or house that could accommodate handicap accessibility including bathrooms, enough space for a sanctuary and social hall and a kitchen. Hoping to stay within Holyoke or the vicinity was also a consideration. We have made a letter of intent to buy a building in South Hadley which is only a couple of miles away. It is a former Peoples Bank which is about 3500 square feet, all on one floor with 3 handicap accessible entrances, 2 handicap accessible bathrooms, a partial kitchen. enough room to make a sanctuary and social hall to accommodate our growing congregation, and plenty of parking. Whether we will be able to purchase it within our budget remains uncertain. As this year comes to a close, I am still optimistic about our future and grateful to all those who have helped us get through Covid and other problems. We will try to have more in person activities now that Covid seems to be waning in our area.

A special thank you to Joan Rosner who as our former President has been there to help guide me through this very difficult year. And my never-ending gratitude to our retired attorney, Buddy Resnic, who worked tirelessly to negotiate the sale of our building and is helping us in the quest to establish a new, affordable, warm, and welcoming home for our shul.

Many thanks also to all those who have volunteered their time to pack, clean and support the congregation during this past year, especially our office manager Tara Neddeau, David Scher, our officers, and Board of Directors. We will continue to need your support as we forge ahead into an unknown but promising future.

Once We Were Home: A Novel by Jennifer Rosner When your past is stolen, where do you belong?

Ana will never forget her mother's face when she and her baby brother, Oskar, were sent out of their Polish ghetto and into the arms of a Christian friend. For Oskar, though, their new family is the only one he remembers. When a woman from a Jewish reclamation organization seizes them, believing she has their best interest at heart, Ana sees an opportunity to reconnect with her roots, while Oskar sees only the loss of the home he loves.

Roger grows up in a monastery in France, inventing stories and trading riddles with his best friend in a life of quiet concealment. When a relative seeks to retrieve him, the Church steals him across the Pyrenees before relinquishing him to family in Jerusalem.

Renata, a post-graduate student in archaeology, has spent her life unearthing secrets from the past--except for her own. After her mother's death, Renata's grief is entwined with all the questions her mother left unanswered, including why they fled Germany so quickly when Renata was a little girl.

Two decades later, they are each building lives for themselves, trying to move on from the trauma and loss that haunts them. But as their stories converge in Israel, in unexpected ways, they must each ask where and to whom they truly belong.

Beautifully evocative and tender, filled with both luminosity and anguish, *Once We Were Home* reveals a little-known history. Based on the true stories of children stolen during wartime, this heart-wrenching novel raises questions of complicity and responsibility, belonging and identity, good intentions and unforeseen consequences, as it confronts what it really means to find home.




