About the Month of Tishrei

Tishrei is the first month of the Jewish year. It is a month full of celebration. Beginning with the High Holidays, we celebrate Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah. Each of these holidays is filled with meaningful customs and traditions. Throughout this month, there are plenty of opportunities to connect, to be inspired and become more fulfilled and in tune with our true inner selves. Tishrei is considered the "head" of the year and the source from which we draw our strength and inspiration throughout the upcoming year.



From the Rabbi

Last Wednesday, August 21, I set my watch alarm to wake me at 6:15 am so I could arrive on time for the 8:00 am morning minyan the next day at Sons of Zion. The alarm went off as usual. I woke up as usual. I turned off the alarm as usual. And, NOT as usual, I fell right back to sleep.

About half an hour later, I woke up again,

realized what had happened, rushed through my morning routine, and arrived at the synagogue only slightly late. I opened the door for the person who had arrived on time, and we began the service.

Early in the service we come to the morning blessings. These blessings express awareness and gratitude each morning as we experience the phenomena of the new day. For example, the blessing for giving sight to the blind refers to our opening our eyes, for clothing the naked corresponds to our getting dressed, for releasing the bound reflects the act of sitting up in bed and stretching, and for guiding us on our path is for setting us on our destination, and so on. (These translations and examples are adapted from The Complete ArtScroll Siddur and Siddur Sim Shalom).

I like reciting these words at the beginning of the new day. They help make me mindful that even the most mundane actions of everyday living are a blessing that I should not take for granted. I am truly fortunate that I can wake up, get out of bed, get dressed, and so on.

Last Thursday I came to realize and appreciate an additional aspect of these blessings. Here's how it happened.

Many prayerbooks render the first of this series of morning blessings as our thankful acknowledgement for our God-given ability to distinguish between day and night. I much prefer the literal translation appreciating God for giving the rooster the ability to distinguish between day and night. Back in the day – before alarm clocks, it was the crowing of the rooster at the break of dawn that awakened us to the new day. Today for many of us it is the sound of our alarm clock, rather than the crowing of the rooster, that marks the end of night and the dawn of the new day, and that calls us to wake up and get moving.

Last Thursday, however, I heard the rooster/alarm clock awakening me to the new day, I turned it off, turned over, and went right back to sleep.

So when I said the blessing for the rooster/alarm clock near the beginning of the service on the morning that I overslept, something "dawned" on me: it is not enough to say a blessing to God for a rooster, an alarm clock, for clothes to wear, for so many of the other things in life that we need. **Our reciting a blessing is not just an expression of gratitude to God; it is also a call to action to ourselves.** If I thank God for my alarm clock (my modern day rooster), but go back to sleep when it sounds, what kind of a blessing is that?!

Stated differently, it is an important first step to feel and express gratitude to God for the blessings in our lives. But another step must follow: we need to make something of the blessing that we are thankful for. Am I thankful for the new day? Very nice. So what am I going to do with the gift of this day to make it meaningful?

Am I thankful to God for opening my eyes each morning? Very nice...for starters. But how am I going to respond to this blessing of sight by using it to make a positive difference each day I say this blessing?

It is important for us to express our prayers, our blessings, to God; but it is equally as important for us to make something of the blessings that we recite and that we have been granted.

In about a month from now, we will have the opportunity to hear another kind of sound, the shofar. It's also a sound that we say a blessing over. But unlike a rooster crowing or an alarm clock buzzing waking our bodies from sleep, the shofar is a moral alarm clock that calls our consciences to action. Unlike thanking God for the rooster/alarm clock that announces each morning, the blessing over the shofar says nothing about the one who sounds the shofar. Instead it addresses each of us *lishmo'ah kol shofar* – to hear/heed/ act in response to the sound of the shofar.

The word *shema* – hear/heed – in our prayers is sometimes directed to God; but just as often it is directed to us: to hear the call, wake up spiritually and morally, and take the appropriate action.

A poster outside the small sanctuary at Sons of Zion quotes Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel as saying: "A Jew is asked to take a leap of action, rather than a leap of faith."

We don't have to believe that God made the rooster crow at dawn or the alarm clock to ring to wake us up. But when the alarm is sounded at the beginning of each day or the shofar is sounded at the beginning of each New Year, may we have the strength, courage, and wisdom to hear, heed, and respond with a fitting leap of action.

- 1. Synagogue member in good standing for at least 5 years prior to death are entitled to a free plot
- 2. Plot fee for non-members is \$4,500. Plot for a spouse on a double lot is \$2,250.
- 3. Opening and closing of grave is \$800
- 4. Perpetual care is \$1,500.
- 5. Cremated remains are permitted. Digging of hole for urn or ashes is \$100 in addition to the plot fee (instead of a grave fee).

Non-Jewish spouses or family members will be buried in a separate plot (no non-Jewish religious symbols are allowed).

No concrete vaults are allowed. Simple unfinished wood caskets only.

Taharah-ritual Jewish washing and shroud are required, but a shomer or watch person is optional.

A particular plot may be reserved for \$100. There are several plots in the new section that were previously reserved and are now unused. Please call for more details.
