
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About the Month of Elul

Elul is the 12th and final month in the Jewish calendar. It is a month that connects the past year with the coming year—a time when we reflect on where we stand and where we should be going. It is called "the month of repentance," "the month of mercy" and "the month of forgiveness."



A Message from the Rabbi

Requesting Forgiveness and Expressing Appreciation -Spiritual Preparation for the Days of Awe

I'd like to suggest a very real and concrete practice that can enhance the potential for transformation that the Days of Awe hold out for us.

We know that the Ten Days of Repentance from Rosh Hashana to Yom Kippur is a time to ask for forgiveness, but how many of us actually do it? Maybe we ask good friends and family with words such as: if I have said or done anything to hurt you, please forgive me. That's a start, but how many of us really name and own and deeply feel what we regret when asking for forgiveness, especially if it's from someone we don't know or don't like so well?

This Elul to help prepare us to do the hard - but ultimately liberating - work of asking for forgiveness, I invite you to actually put pen to paper or fingers to keyboard and write at least one **letter of forgiveness**. Write down what you are asking to be forgiven for, describe how you are feeling about what you did, ask sincerely for forgiveness, and talk about how you would like to act differently in the future under the same circumstances.

Your letter of forgiveness might be to:

- · a friend
- · a family member
- · someone deceased
- · yourself
- · God
- · our congregation
- · the earth
- the next generation
- or whoever or whatever comes to mind

Don't just think about doing it; actually write it. You might or might not end up sending the letter or having an in-person conversation about its contents.

I am hoping that you also might consider reading your letter at **our abbreviated service/study session on the second day of Rosh Hashana, Tuesday morning, September 27**. (Feel free to skip parts that you might not want to share.) **Please email me at saulp@umass.edu by Tuesday, September 20**, with any questions or if you have already drafted a letter and are willing to read it (or have someone else read it if you want to remain anonymous) as part of our second day Rosh Hashana second day service/study session.

In recent years, we have also encouraged one another to use the High Holidays as a time to affirm the good, positive things we appreciate in others or in ourselves, and not only to focus on regrets and sins. Dwelling on our own faults and shortcomings can bring us down and make it harder for us to get in touch with and actually express our thanks for the support and caring of others. Really expressing heart-felt appreciation can be as powerful and positively transformational as asking for forgiveness – both for ourselves and for the people to whom we express our gratitude and affirmation.

A Message from the Rabbi (continued)

So please also consider drafting a **letter of appreciation** to any of the recipients listed in the bullet points above and reading your letter at the same second day Rosh Hashana event. Please email me at <u>saulp@umass.edu</u> by September 20, if you would be willing to read your letter at the service/study session on Rosh Hashana second day.

Last year on second day Rosh Hashana people shared prayers that they had composed prior to the holiday. It was a wonderful gift of the heart that we gave to one another. Sharing our letters of forgiveness or appreciation can be transformational as well: both for those who write them and for those who hear them.

Thank you in advance both for inspiring others with sharing your letters and for taking an important step in enriching your own experience of the Days of Awe.

President's Message

Shana Tova to all our members and friends. I am happy to report that we have voted to have in-person services at the synagogue for Selichot, Rosh Hashanah I and II, Kol Nidre, and Yom Kippur. It will be our first services in our synagogue building in two and one-half years because of Covid, and we hope to see you there. A Zoom option for those who are unable to come to the synagogue is in the works.

In other news, after long and thoughtful consideration, the Board of Directors is actively working on finding a new home for our congregation. To explain, a brief history of the congregation is needed.

Congregation Sons of Zion was founded in 1904 by a group of mostly Russian, Polish, and Lithuanian immigrants looking for a better life in Holyoke, Massachusetts. They originally met in a building in South Holyoke. In 1927 the congregation had grown enough to purchase a former church and the land around it at our present location of Maple and Cabot Streets. Since then, it has been remodeled with the still-beautiful sanctuary we have today.

After WWII, more than seventy years ago, Congregation Sons of Zion's thriving membership that included families with a lot of children, in coordination with Congregation Rodphey Sholom, built the three-story Jewish Community Center addition on the Congregation Sons of Zion building, which served the greater Holyoke Jewish community for many years.

Most, if not all of you, who read this Newsletter know that the Jewish population within Holyoke has dwindled, particularly over the past thirty to forty years. Many of you have moved away; some of you to be closer to your children who no longer live near Holyoke, Massachusetts. Though, from time-to-time over the past twenty years, individuals, and families with Jewish affiliation from neighboring cities and towns have expressed interest in our synagogue, our Maple and Cabot Streets location has not been convenient for many and frankly, the building is not appealing. In short, our building needs a lot of updating: roof, heating system, pipes, and décor; and our demographics have changed, our needs have evolved, our location is a deterrent to attracting and sustaining interest in membership, and our building is beyond our ability to sustain its upkeep and rehabilitate it.

The Board of Directors has received a "letter of intent" from a large corporation interested in purchasing our property. The question is "where will we go"? Will the money from the sale of our building be enough to purchase a new one? What kind of congregation do we want to be?

These are the topics that are now being discussed. Nothing has been decided yet since these are issues that take a lot of consideration. Your respectful suggestions and feedback are welcome.



We Were the Lucky Ones by Georgia Hunter

The Kurc family shouldn't have survived the Holocaust. In the spring of 1939 three generations are living relatively normal lives in Poland, despite the hardships Jews face. When war breaks out and the family is cast to the wind, the five Kurc siblings do everything they can to find their way through a devastated continent to freedom.

Addy, a musician, charms his way into possession of a Brazilian visa and into the first class piano lounge on a ship full of refugees bound for Rio; Jakob marries the love of his life in an abandoned house to a soundtrack of air sirens; Mila hides her daughter in a Catholic convent outside of Warsaw, only to return weeks later to find the convent in ruins; Genek endures a brutal winter in a Siberian gulag before embarking with his wife and newborn son on a year-long exodus through Persia to fight for the Allies; and Halina attempts to flee over the Austrian Alps on foot - while pregnant. All this, across continents and often in ignorance as to the fate of the rest of their family, while the wheels of war turn. We Were the Lucky Ones is a profoundly moving and memorable novel based on the author's family experiences.

Cemetery Rules

- Synagogue member in good standing for at least 5 years prior to death are entitled to a free plot
- 2. Plot fee for non-members is \$4,500. Plot for a spouse on a double lot is \$2,250.
- 3. Opening and closing of grave is \$800
- 4. Perpetual care is \$1,500.
- 5. Cremated remains are permitted. Digging of hole for urn or ashes is \$100 in addition to the plot fee (instead of a grave fee).
- 6. Non-Jewish spouses or family members will be buried in a separate plot (no non-Jewish religious symbols are allowed).
- 7. No concrete vaults are allowed. Simple, unfinished wood caskets only.
- 8. Taharah-ritual Jewish washing and shroud are required, but a shomer or watch person is optional.
- 9. A particular plot may be reserved for \$100. There are several plots in the new section that were previously reserved and are now unused. Please call for more details.



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
