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About the Month of Elul

Elul is the 12th and final month in the Jewish calendar. It is a month that connects the past year with the coming year—a time when we reflect on where we stand and where we should be going. It is called “the month of repentance,” “the month of mercy” and “the month of forgiveness.”

We welcome the High Holidays in Elul.





From the Rabbi

How do we celebrate the High Holidays when we can't gather in our synagogue because of the coronavirus? That is the challenge we face this year for the first time in our history as a congregation, and likely for the first time in all of Jewish history. There is no guidebook to help us navigate these unprecedented circumstances.

So we brought together a committee.

Early on the committee established that services via Zoom (with the option of phone access for those who don't do Zoom) would be the safest way to include everyone. We also acknowledged the limitations of Zoom. Being on Zoom uninterrupted for several hours can be draining.

So instead of long non-stop Zoom services, the committee decided to shorten them as much as possible. For the services that are still fairly long, like Yom Kippur morning, we included breaks, so people can step away from their Zoom screens or phones.

We are also dividing up the services into several component parts by theme: warm up singing, Torah reading, study/discussion, Yizkor remembrances and so on. Each component is scheduled for a specific time slot (A timeline of services will soon arrive by email. Watch for it!). That way we can each select the parts of the service that we appreciate most.

Another challenge of Zoom is singing together because Zoom does not synchronize voices well. When many voices try to sing the same prayer together unmuted, the resulting sound is discordant and chaotic. It is less disturbing when only one person leads the singing with everyone else muting their sound but still singing to themselves, but then we lose some of the special feeling of hearing many voices lifted up together in prayerful song.

Thanks to the technological genius of Richard Freyman, he is going to record and synchronize in advance individual congregants singing the major High Holiday prayers. In the Zoom service, thanks to his mixing of all the individual voices, it will sound as if they are singing together. This will give us the feeling of being in a service. And when we sing along with them while we mute our sound on Zoom, we can in effect lift up our voices and our spirits together. In addition to coming up with **solutions like these for what we want to avoid** - long services and jumbled Zoom singing - the committee also set **positive goals for our High Holidays**. Our list included: **we want services with spirituality, to hear the familiar melodies and the shofar, to**

celebrate the holidays together and be able to see one another, to include an awareness of Tikkun Olam - what is happening in the world around us, and to have an opportunity for self-reflection and for people to share their thoughts. We want to derive hope and healing from our Jewish tradition to help us find strength and perspective to keep going.

A pretty tall order, but with these outcomes in mind, we proceeded to plan services and events that we hope and intend will embody these elements. Watch for the timeline of services being emailed separately to get an idea of how these elements are incorporated in our High Holiday celebrations. Here are some specific examples of what to expect, and how you can actively participate.

If you like to connect informally and socially with others, there will be a Zoom version of what SOZ calls Shana Tova Together. This year it means **sharing holiday meals while still being in our own homes.**

Whether it's Friday night dinner on September 18 (the evening of Rosh Hashana) or lunch the next day after the Rosh Hashana morning services, set your table, connect on Zoom, and join with others for schmoozing and eating festival meals together from the comfort and safety of your own home. See details elsewhere in this newsletter.

New this year, we will have **two options for the Torah service on Rosh Hashana morning and on Yom Kippur morning.** You can choose a more traditional Hebrew chanting of the Torah portion, along with commentary that will help make it accessible. Or you can choose an English reading and discussion of the haftarah and the issues it raises -- about structured or spontaneous prayer on the first morning of Rosh Hashana, and about the relationship between ritual observance and tikkun olam, working for social justice and lovingkindness in the world.

For Yizkor, the service of remembrance of departed family and friends that is part of the Yom Kippur morning service, we will recite the familiar prayers and conclude as usual with the Mourner's Kaddish. We will also include time for personal remembrances, but in a new way. We are encouraging congregants to gather photographs of the people they want to recall in advance. For a designated time in the middle of the Yizkor service, we will be invited to turn off our sound and our video so that we can, one by one, look at the photos of our departed and say to them whatever is in our hearts. Words of gratitude, words of love, words we wish we could have spoken to them and never did, words requesting forgiveness or granting forgiveness as the case may be. We could never do this in quite the same way in regular

services. This may be one way Zoom can enable us to have a more powerful spiritual and emotional experience than would have been possible otherwise.

Do you have a memory or story of a loved one who has been especially important in your life that you are willing to share? As a lead-in to help us get in touch with our private Yizkor recollections during Zoom, we are asking two or three people to speak first to the congregation as a whole. If you are willing to speak for a minute or two about someone who is departed but still part of your life, please email me by Monday, September 21, at saulp@umass.edu.

Do you have a favorite prayer that is recited on the High Holidays -- one that has a personal memory, story or meaning for you? If so, please consider joining others who are volunteering to speak about their special prayer as we approach the recitation of that prayer in the service. This is a wonderful way to share our personal reflection and understanding of the High Holidays. So far we have volunteers for the Shma, Avinu Malkaynu, praying for healing, the book of Jonah, and Ahava Raba (we are loved with an unending love). These short talks – most are about a minute or so – can help us all connect deeper with our prayers and with one another. Please email me a week in advance of services at saulp@umass.edu if you would like to speak about your special prayer.

Our Yom Kippur services end with a tekiah gedolah, a long and sustained blast of the shofar. **All shofar blowers are welcome to join in this great culminating moment of affirmation and release.** Please let me know if you're able to join us.

I am deeply grateful to the members of the committee that helped come up with these -- and other - ways to make our High Holidays as meaningful and spiritual, warm, communal, and participatory as possible. They are Marge Bloom, Rich Freyman, Al Hutt, Deb Levine, Joan Rosner, Mady Schorsch, Nitza Seaver, and Cindy Vieu. One of the members of the committee emailed me saying: "I have found the process of working on the High Holiday liturgy an eye-opening experience. I think that services this year will be so much more meaningful to me because of my participation in the discussion..."

I hope and expect that High Holidays at SOZ this year will be more meaningful for all of us because of the extraordinary work and dedication of this committee. I have greatly enjoyed planning together with them and I am looking forward to sharing the fruits of their labor with the whole congregation these High Holidays.

Cemetery Rules

1. Synagogue member in good standing for at least 5 years prior to death are entitled to a free plot
2. Plot fee for non-members is \$4,500. Plot for a spouse on a double lot is \$2,250.
3. Opening and closing of grave is \$800
4. Perpetual care is \$1,500.
5. Cremated remains are permitted. Digging of hole for urn or ashes is \$100 in addition to the plot fee (instead of a grave fee).


Non-Jewish spouses or family members will be buried in a separate plot (no non-Jewish religious symbols are allowed).

No concrete vaults are allowed. Simple, unfinished wood caskets only.

Taharah-ritual Jewish washing and shroud are required, but a shomer or watch person is optional.

A particular plot may be reserved for \$100. There are several plots in the new section that were previously reserved and are now unused. Please call for more details.

2 cups grated carrots
 1 cup flour
 ½ cup light brown sugar
 ½ tsp baking soda
 ½ cup melted shortening or vegetable oil (canola)
 1 tsp. baking powder
 2 x-large eggs (or large)
 1 tsp. salt (optional)
 1 tbsp. hot water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Mix all ingredients together and pour into a greased ring mold or Bundt pan. (brownie pan works too) Bake at 350F degrees for 1 hour. Serve immediately.
