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About the Month of Sivan

In the month of Sivan, we celebrate the holiday of Shavuot, when the Torah was given by G-d to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai more than 3,300 years ago. Every year on the holiday of Shavuot, we renew our acceptance of G-d's gift, and G-d "re-gives" the Torah.

The holiday of Shavuot is a two-day holiday, beginning at sundown of the fifth of Sivan and lasting until nightfall of the seventh of Sivan. (In Israel it is a one-day holiday, ending at nightfall of the sixth of Sivan.)



From the Rabbi

This past Shabbat (May 30) coincided with the second day of Shavuot, the holiday that traditionally marks the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. Our services for this Shabbat of Shavuot include three special features: the recitation of Hallel (a collection of especially uplifting psalms of praise), the reading of the biblical Scroll of Ruth, and a specially selected Torah reading that does not follow the usual weekly order.

In our Torah discussion, we examined a common theme that appears in all three of these quite different elements of the service.

Psalm 113, the opening psalm of Hallel, reminds us of those in need with these words: "God lifts the poor out of the dust, raising the needy from the rubbish heap." Since we are called upon to be God's partner by following in God's ways, this is also a call to action on our part and not just a description of divine attributes.

The Scroll of Ruth also picks up the theme of financial difficulty. Because of a famine, Elimelech and his wife Naomi and their two sons leave their home Beit Lechem to live in the land of Moab. Elimelech dies there, as do his two sons who both had married Moabite women, leaving Naomi and her two daughters-in-law, Orpah and Ruth, in even more difficult circumstances. Naomi decides to return to Beit Lechem and urges her daughters-in-law to return to their families of origin in their homeland of Moab. Ruth, however, refuses to leave her widowed mother-in-law Naomi, and instead pledges loyalty to Naomi, to Naomi's God, and to Naomi's people.

Back in Beit Lechem, Boaz, a wealthy relative of Naomi's deceased husband, treats Naomi and her Moabite daughter-in-law Ruth with kindness and compassion (best described in Hebrew as chesed). Long story short, Boaz marries Ruth, they have a child Obed, who was the grandfather of King David. Ruth's loyalty to her struggling mother-in-law Naomi and Boaz's chesed for Naomi and Ruth eventually result in a great King of Israel who Jewish tradition ascribes to be the ancestor of the messiah.

The Torah reading for Shabbat Shavuot addresses how to help people facing financial difficulties. The Etz Hayim Torah and Commentary that we use at SOZ explains that this Torah portion is "concerned with the type of debt incurred by the poor and insolvent: a farmer in dire need of funds because of crop failure and a city dweller destitute as a result of unemployment. Loans to such individuals were regarded as acts of philanthropy rather than commercial ventures and the forgiving of such loans was an extension of the generosity." (Page 1077) Every seventh year, those debts are to be cancelled. We are called upon to open our hearts and our hands to those in need even to grant a loan near the end of the seven year cycle when all loans are forgiven.

These teachings about generosity towards those in difficult financial circumstances seem especially relevant and important today. We are living at a time when unemployment is rising to levels not seen in this country since the Great Depression. How can we, as individuals and as a congregation, act in keeping our Jewish values of chesed and generosity?

If we find ourselves in financial difficulties because of the Covid-19 pandemic or any other reason, we may be hesitant to ask for help. What we learn from these readings is that our tradition acknowledges that hard financial times are part of life that can happen to any of us. If we are in need, it is ok to ask for help in the form of a loan or some other source of support. In fact by doing so, we are also enabling someone else to fulfill their obligation to be open-hearted and giving.

And if we have the means, especially now, we should look for opportunities to help others. Some of us may have received unexpected financial support from the government even though our finances are stable. What better time to share our good fortune with those who really are in need?

There is a Rabbi's Discretionary Fund at SOZ that is available to help out people in need. When I hear of a congregant in need, I am able to write them a check from the contributions that SOZ members have made to this fund over the years. These transactions are kept confidential; they can provide both financial and emotional support to enable us to make it through tough circumstances.

If you are in need, please let me know. Or if you know someone who is in need, please either encourage them to contact me or ask me to contact them. This is one very important way our congregation can be a kehillah kedosha, a holy, caring community in keeping with these Shavuot values, especially at this challenging time.

The limited funds in my discretionary account are used to benefit congregation members and the local Jewish community. We are also part of the larger Holyoke community. Do we as a religious institution or as individuals have an obligation to that community as well? Especially given the considerable toll that Covid-19 has taken among the vulnerable population of Holyoke, is there some meaningful way we as a synagogue could be helpful?

One possible suggestion to begin the discussion: if we received a check from the government that we don't need for basic needs, might we consider using some or all of it for people or organizations in need locally? We could do this as individuals, or maybe the synagogue could collect these donations and disburse them in the name of our local Jewish community.

Whether we are in need of help or in need of being helpful, may these Shabbat Shavuot teachings encourage us to make a meaningful difference for ourselves and for others.
